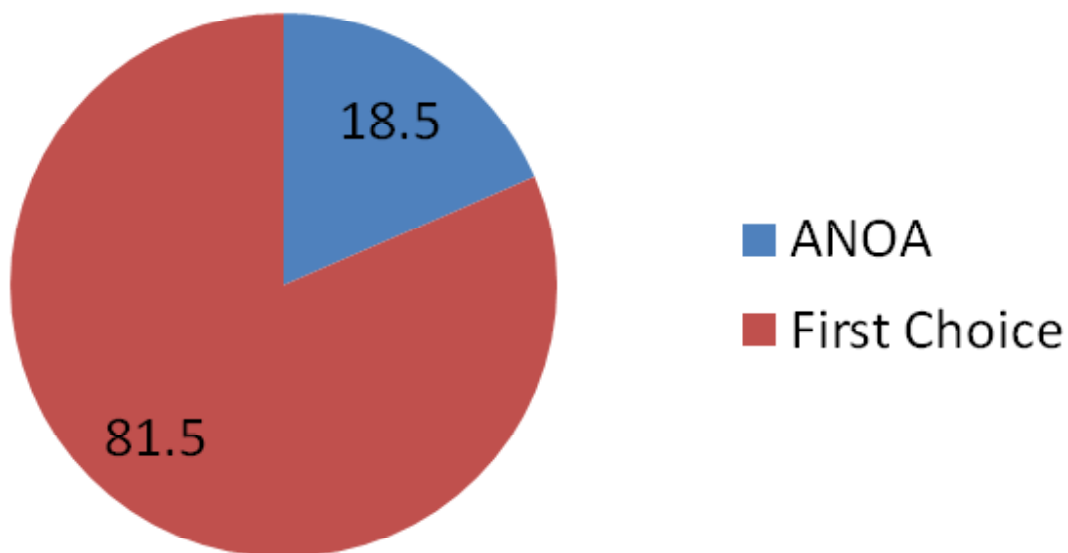

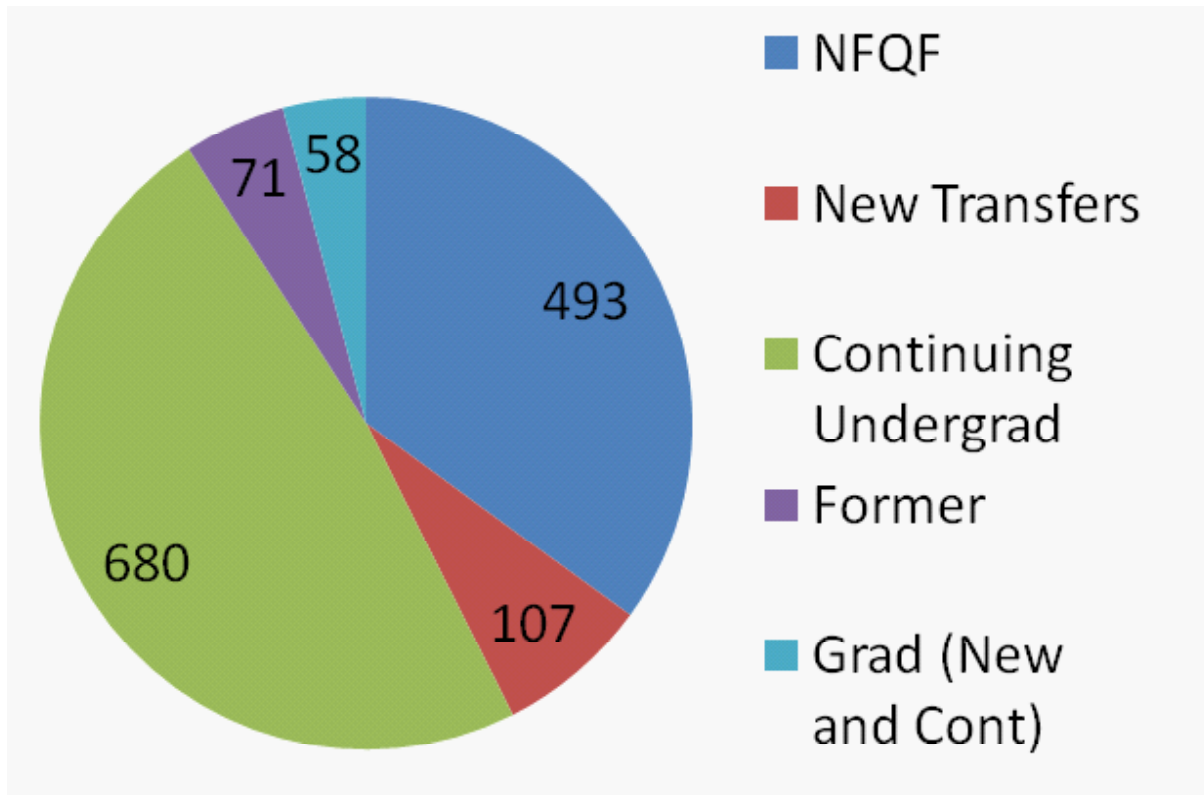

# PSEOP/The Academy

Staff: 1 Coordinator

The Ohio State University Academy provides expanded educational opportunities for talented high school students, allowing them to enroll in appropriate college level coursework during their high school years (grades 9-12). Within the Academy, students can enroll as post-secondary enrollment option “A”, wherein the student takes coursework for college credit only and is responsible for paying the cost, or through post secondary enrollment option “B”, wherein the student takes coursework for both high school and college credit with the local school district paying the costs.

During the 2008-2009 school year, Ohio State Lima enrolled 27 students in the Academy Program. One of those students participated as an option “A” student during the Summer Quarter, 2008 and she then continued as an option “B” student for the remainder of the year. All other students participated as option “B” students.

Of the Academy students the distribution by rank is as follows:

## **Transfer**

During the 2008-2009 Academic Year, continued efforts were taken to continue to work with the Ohio Transfer Council and the linkage helps to provide students with the most current information and access between both institutions on the Lima Campus as well as other institutions of higher learning. This service provides clarity for all users and facilitates enhanced mobility and transfer opportunities for students.

## **Multicultural Affairs**

The events held during the 2008-2009 Academic Year were initiated to promote diversity awareness and appreciation among faculty, staff, students and the extended community. Moreover, the events were well attended and supported by a broad constituency.

The Performing Arts & Lecture Series (PALS), which is funded by The Ohio State University at Lima and Rhodes State College, is designed to offer easy access to a variety of cultural programs for the campus community and the local community at no cost. So, this is the path that was taken and continuous evaluation of the Senate will be employed to determine its effectiveness. ### **Student Athletics and Recreation**

The Student Athletics and Recreation Office as a cost-shared area of function on the Lima Campus of The Ohio State University at Lima and Rhodes State College provides a number of services to the entire campus community as well as the extended community.

#### Events hosted

Throughout the 2008-2009 Academic Year, this department hosted 37 home contests for our volleyball, men's and women's basketball, baseball and golf teams. Moreover, along with the home games, we also host a number community and campus activities. To name just a few, the Allen County Health Department's Health Fair, the College Fair, a Job Fair, AAU Basketball Tournament and two Red Cross blood drives all used the gymnasium.

#### Club sports

Volleyball Record was 0-11 ORCC. There were 12 players (7 OSU Lima and 5 Rhodes State) and the team finished second in our division in the ORCC. Moreover, we had a new coach this year (Allison Moore) and she will not be returning for the next academic year. So, we will once again be searching for a replacement.

Men's Basketball Record was 5-25, 2-11 ORCC. We started the season with 12 players (6 OSU Lima and 6 Rhodes State) and we finished the season with 9 players. Freshman Ryan Schroeder was selected first team All Ohio Regional Campus Conference squad and he will be returning next year. Moreover, Ryan will be holding open gyms throughout the months of August and September of 2009.

Women's Basketball Record was 4-14, 6-16 ORCC. The season was started with 10 players on the squad and finished with 9 (2 OSU Lima and 7 Rhodes State). Moreover, as in the past, this team did not practice much but they competed well. Although the record may reflect differently, staying with a conference schedule with limited non-conference games worked well this year.

Baseball Record was 6-22, 5-7 ORCC. With the assistance of Abe Ambroza, we started this season with 24 players on the roster. This was the largest baseball roster in 18 years. However, by the time the conference schedule started, there were 20 remaining players (15 OSU Lima and 5 Rhodes State). Freshman Chris Boyd (Lincolnview) and Mitchell Schultz (Botkins) were first team All Ohio Regional Campus Conference and Ryan Mawer (Paulding)

and Adam Hemker (Delphos St. Johns) were named on the second team. We also have 13 of the players returning to play baseball next year.

A Successful Golf Season was again posted this year. The season was ended as being tied for second place in the ORCC and fifth at ORC State. Thus, after winning the ORCC Golf Championship the past two seasons under the leadership of Jim Maley, the team fell short to Newark in the ORCC and tied second to OU Lancaster. This year we had 13 players (8 OSU Lima and 5 Rhodes State). Moreover, Kevin Maus (Wapakoneta) received second team ORCC honors.

### Recreation

During the 2008-2009 Academic Year, there were over 1818 recorded sign ups to use the gym and weight room. The breakdown was 771 Ohio State Lima, 941 Rhodes State and 106 not indentified. But, these numbers only reflect approximately 70%-80% of the individuals that actually signed in during the year.

Last year we expanded our gym hours to 6:30 p.m. and this year, our gym hours were expanded on Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays for open gym basketball, dodge ball and volleyball. As a result of students living in the off campus student housing complexes, we expanded our open gym evening hours to primarily accommodate this population.

However, we have found that intramurals are basically absent from our schedule. It seems that the change in the academic schedule still hinders the ability of students to engage in intramurals. On the average, we have experienced between 12 and 20 students who participated after 5:30 p.m. during the evening open gym hours. It seems that students continue to want an informal recreation experience.

### EDU PAES classes

All of the classes this year had over 24 students and both the winter and spring volleyball classes were full. Moreover, we were able to offer two PE classes (volleyball and basketball) and we were able to add golf and bowling twice a year. Thus, we were able to offer Flag Football (Autumn Quarter 2009), Volleyball (Winter Quarter 2009 and Spring Quarter 2009) and Basketball (Winter Quarter 2009).

This year we also brought our basketball officiating class back into the mix. The goal of the officiating class is to prepare students to take the certification test in order to be able to officiate in high school.

## **Academic Programs**

The Ohio State University at Lima continues to offer ten programs that lead to the baccalaureate degree and four Master's degree programs, in addition to providing the general education classes that provide a foundation to any of the more than 170 majors available on the Columbus campus. The undergraduate degree programs are: Biology, Business, Dental Hygiene, Early & Middle Childhood Education, English, Family Financial Management, Health Sciences/Health Management, History, Nursing, and Psychology.

Both the Dental Hygiene and Nursing programs are baccalaureate completion programs, which build on preexisting coursework. The Dental Hygiene program is a collaborative program with Rhodes State College, using its technical degree in Dental Hygiene as a starting platform. The Nursing program is an RN to BSN completion, building on the RN certification.

Ohio State Lima also has three Master's degree programs in Education (MA in Education, MEd. in Early & Middle Childhood Education, and an MA in Workforce Development and Adult Education), and one in Social Work (MSW). The MEd program is the largest of the graduate programs on the Lima campus, with an enrollment of 47 students as of spring 2009.

The largest of the undergraduate programs at Ohio State Lima are: Early to Middle Childhood Education, with 191 majors; Psychology, with 78 majors; Biology, with 69 majors (7 of which are Zoology majors); and History, with 55 majors. All of these numbers are from Spring Quarter 2009.

The on-site degree programs provide a complement to Ohio State Lima's traditional mission to provide the first one or two years of a university education, preparatory to a move to the Columbus campus, or even a transfer to another university if that better suits a student's needs. Whether a student finishes his or her degree on the Lima campus, on the Columbus campus, or elsewhere, the goal is to prepare students to excel in their chosen profession and in our community, so quality is always a focus. To that end, Ohio State Lima continues to investigate opportunities to add programs that meet community needs and maintain the standards expected of an Ohio State education. Programs areas under consideration as we move toward 2009-10 include: Sociology and Criminology; Social Work; and, Theatre. There are also investigations into adding courses that may provide professional certification or enhance a student's preparation for the move to the Columbus campus, in areas such as special education or engineering.

Some of the other new and continuing academic initiatives are highlighted below.

## **Academic Assessment**

Ohio State Lima faculty are engaged in developing Learning Outcomes Assessment strategies for courses offered at the Ohio State Lima Campus. Following the timetable developed for our campus, we are currently engaged in developing assessment strategies in five of our GEC courses. This group includes (with leading faculty given in parentheses): Chemistry 101 (Ruth Kinder), English 110 (Doug Sutton-Ramspeck), History 151 (Allison Gilmore), Mathematics 104 (Pat Johnson), and Psychology 100 (Joe Green). Faculty leading the effort for these courses are working closely with their colleagues on the Columbus campus. Reports on this work and assessment strategies to be used with these courses are due in January 2010, and the regional campus information will likely be included in reports from their respective departments. The next assessment effort on our timeline is to develop assessment strategies for all of our remaining GEC courses.

## **Associate Degrees with Areas of Concentration – Targeted Investments in Excellence (TIE) Initiative**

Work continued in 2008-09 on the development of our Associate Degree programs, a project central to the Ohio State strategic plan because it supports the Governor's education and workforce development initiatives. Under the Ohio State strategic plan, the Lima campus could develop Associate Degrees with areas of concentration as TIE initiatives and in concert with community and business partners, and perhaps even in partnership with local Career Centers. Currently, one such partnership is being developed with Allen County's Jobs and Family Services and the Apollo Joint Vocational Center.

The Associate Degree is a 90 credit hour degree, consisting of 50 hours of GECs and 40 hours of electives. Packages of courses can be created, in specific content areas, which could be taken as electives, thus giving students a coherent body of study in a particular field. It is believed that associate degrees with an area of concentration might be more attractive to employers. Some examples of areas of concentration would include our existing minor programs (e.g. Business or Theatre), or in association with our existing baccalaureate programs (such as Health Care Management). The objective is to offer a goal for potential students, a benchmark for area employers to see the readiness of our graduates, and to provide a foundation for continued education toward the baccalaureate degree and beyond.

The TIE initiative complements Ohio State Lima's participation in the Ohio Skills Bank Education Committee, Region 3 (OSB EDR3) efforts to create more transparency and greater opportunities for Ohio's citizens. The OSB EDR3 has identified four career pathways in our region, in Health Care, Business Services, Distribution & Logistics, and in Manufacturing, and created educational asset maps for each of these pathways, which potential students can now evaluate to assess educational and career opportunities in Region 3. Associate degrees could be a crucial element in this process.

In the Health Care pathway, specifically, the creation of stackable certificates at the ABE and Career Center level will provide partnership opportunities for Ohio State Lima, opportunities that will include the Associate degrees with areas of concentration. The Ohio Skills Bank is in budgetary limbo as of this writing, but the potential partnerships have been identified and Ohio State Lima will continue to pursue those partnerships in 2009-10.

### **Concurrent Enrollment**

The Concurrent Enrollment Agreement allows students at both Ohio State Lima and Rhodes State College (the co-located technical college) to take courses offered on the Lima Campus from the other institution. The key feature of this agreement is that the students are enrolled in the courses through the institution offering the classes, rather than their home institution. The course credit then transfers back to the student's home institution. Beginning with the Autumn Quarter 2009, the agreement will be modified and simplified, so that students from both institutions will pay full tuition of the course offering institution for all classes, but will have the application fee waived to facilitate this exchange.

### **Distance Learning Initiatives**

Another initiative begun in 2005-06 and continued throughout the 2008-09 academic year, is the effort to develop a strategy for the creation of online and other forms of distance-learning courses. An initial survey of our faculty in 2005 produced responses from eight people who indicated an interest in developing distance learning or online courses. The faculty Academic Planning Committee has endorsed this effort and we have formed a group of individuals (Javad Abdalkhani, Joe Brandesky, Dean Cristol, Ruth Kinder, and Lynn Trinko) to serve as an ad hoc Online Course Development Guidance Committee. They had their first meeting on July 10, 2006. The principal issues discussed at that meeting centered around three points: 1) online course approval process, 2) online course developmental support and compensation, 3) a clear definition/description of what constitutes an "online" course.

Currently, as of the 2008-09 academic year, Ruth Kinder has completed the development of "blended" (online + lab) sections of Chemistry for non-majors (101C and 102C), abetted by three years of grant support from the university. These classes are now a part of our regular schedule of offerings in Chemistry.

Dr. Kamesh Casukhela and Jaya Casukhela continue to work on an online version of Statistics 135. Dr. David Easter is beginning work on an online version of Communications 200 and Dr. Ted Houghton is developing an online version of Sociology 101. Additionally, Ohio State Lima is beginning to work with the Sociology Department in Columbus to receive upper-division courses in Sociology and Criminology via DL.

While Ohio State Lima faculty have worked to create and offer DL courses, most distance education on our campus is received from the Columbus campus. Our degree completion programs in Dental Hygiene and Nursing depend on DL courses delivered from the Columbus campus. Through the 2008-09 academic year Ohio State Lima students enrolled in real-time videoconference courses delivered in Accounting, Allied Medicine, Family Resource Management, and Education. The Fisher College of Business delivers many courses for its General Business major via videoconferencing as well. During that same time period, our students could take undergraduate online courses in the Arts and Sciences and in Family Resource Management, as well as graduate courses in Education and Workforce Development.

Clearly, online and other DL course offerings will be a growing part of our curriculum. Already, most of the major classes in our General Business major, out of the Fisher College of Business, are delivered via distance learning. Our challenge will be to insure that the academic quality and integrity that we expect in our traditional classes will be inherent on our online offerings as well.

## **Academic Searches**

The Ohio State University at Lima conducted three tenure-line academic searches during the 2008-2009 academic year, in Evolution, Ecology, and Organismal Biology (EEOB), English, and Psychology. A fourth search, in Mathematics, was canceled during the academic year.

The tenure-line search in EEOB resulted in the hire of Jacqueline Augustine, who comes to Ohio State Lima from Southwest Minnesota State University. Dr. Augustine earned her BS from Miami University, her MS from the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee, and her PhD from Kansas State University. Her research interest is in avian behavioral ecology, and she has specialized in working with undergraduate researchers. She replaces Dr. Patrick Owen, who left Ohio State Lima in 2008.

The English Department successfully conducted a search in Creative Writing during 2008-09, welcoming Doug Sutton-Ramspeck to the department as an Assistant Professor of English. Previously, Doug had served as Director of the Writing Center and a lecturer at Ohio State Lima. His undergraduate degree is from Kenyon College, and he earned an MFA in Creative Writing from the University of California at Irvine. Over 400 of his poems have been published and he is the author of two books of poetry.

The Psychology Department hired Dr. Virginia Tompkins as a Visiting Assistant Professor for 2009-2010, with the option of transitioning the position into a tenure-line if certain publishing benchmarks are met and the Psychology Department in Columbus approves. Dr. Tompkins comes to Ohio State Lima from the University of Florida, where she earned her BS, MS, and PhD degrees. She is a developmental psychologist, whose research specialty is social cognition in preschool-aged children. She replaces Dr. Roger Page, who retired in 2008.

During the 2008-09 academic year the Dean's Office and the Academic Planning Committee, of the Ohio State Lima Faculty Assembly, approved proposals for three new tenure-line faculty searches for 2009-10. The new searches are in Computer Science & Engineering (CS & E), Music, and Theatre. The search in CS & E is a targeted retention search while Theatre is a targeted diversity search.

## **Off-Campus Credit Programs**

### **Putnam County:**

Beginning with the 2006-07 academic year, Ohio State Lima entered a three-year memorandum of understanding (MOU) to offer classes in Ottawa, Ohio, at the new Putnam County Educational Service Center (ESC). This educational outreach project is a continuation of the philosophy that Ohio State is “one university with many doors”, and a direct response to a specific request from Putnam County officials.

The Putnam County Educational Service Center opened for business in September 2006, with the goal of increasing higher education opportunities across the board for county residents. Putnam County officials plan to offer a full menu of classes and training at their new center, from a range of educational providers, and they asked Ohio State Lima to take the lead in offering general education curriculum (GEC) classes, courses that could be carried to the Lima campus, to the Columbus campus, or transferred to another college or university. The MOU between the Putnam County ESC and Ohio State Lima gave OSU exclusive rights to offer GEC courses at the ESC in return for a relaxed enrollment minimum of six students.

In 2008-09 only three classes made enrollment minimums at the Putnam County Center. An American History sequence met winter and spring quarters of 2009, while a developmental Math course (Math 104) met during the winter quarter.

A review of the three-year MOU began in January 2009, with the following conclusions:

- Ohio State Lima wants to continue its partnership with the Putnam County ESC.
- Budgetary considerations mandate that classes in Putnam County meet OSU standards for enrollment minimums (12 for introductory classes/8 for upper-division classes).
- The proliferation of Dual Enrollment programs in the county negates the enrollment base for Ohio State Lima GEC courses? Any classes scheduled in the future should be connected to degree programs, preferably in partnership with other educational institutions. The likeliest partnerships in Putnam County would occur in health-related fields, and that is where Ohio State Lima’s efforts should be concentrated.

Ohio State Lima is also in partnership with the Putnam County ESC and the Ohio Historical Society in a grant proposal to the federal Education Department. The project, if funded, would provide content-based programs to middle school and high school teachers in west-central and northwest Ohio.

Notes: I served as Chair for the 2008 Gordon Research Conference on Photonuclear Reactions. The Gordon Research Conferences (GRC) provide an international forum for the presentation and discussion of frontier research in the biological, chemical, and physical sciences, and their related technologies. The Photonuclear Reactions Gordon Conference has a long tradition and is held every two years. Top scientists from North America, Europe, Asia, Australia, and Africa gather to present the latest results of their research. The conference chair and vice chair are elected by the conference participants. Being chosen to serve in this important function is a great honor and a vote of confidence from my peers. Every conference is evaluated by the Gordon Research Conferences Organization, and needs to be renewed. Our 2008 conference has received high marks, and has been approved for 2010. Preparations for the 2008 meeting have started in early 2007, and continued until the meeting from August 10 - 15, 2008. As Chair, I was responsible for the scientific program of the conference, for fund raising, and for various organizational aspects. In summer 2007, I started working on the program, together with the Vice Chair and the European Coordinator. I started inviting speakers in late summer 2007, and filled the last speaker slots in spring of 2008. To give an impression of the amount of communication involved, besides face-to-face meetings, I have sent and received more than 1600 e-mails regarding the conference, ca. 1300 of these in 2008. I also was in charge 2008. I also was in charge of fund raising: I wrote a successful grant proposal to the National Science Foundation to obtain financial support for young researchers (graduate students and post-docs). My proposal '2008 Photonuclear Reactions Gordon Conference' was approved for an amount of \$5,000 by the National Science Foundation (NSF). In addition, I managed to obtain a fellowship from Nature Publishing Group for a participant from a developing country, as well as special fellowships from the GRC organization for participants from the former Soviet Union/Eastern bloc, and scientists from underrepresented groups.

### **Assessing Spatial Patterns of Crime in Lima, Ohio**

Police departments, city officials and policy makers all recognize the importance of better understanding the dynamics of crime. Both theoretical and applied approaches, or combinations of the two, which provide insight into why and where crime takes place are much in demand. Macrolevel analysis helps to identify problem neighborhoods. Microlevel analysis helps to isolate precise trouble spots within neighborhoods and, as a result, allows for better evaluation of crime and specific socioeconomic, demographic, land use and environmental characteristics associated with these trouble spots. This paper details a framework for better understanding the spatial characteristics of crime based upon the use of geographical information systems (GIS) and quantitative techniques. Lima, Ohio, provides a case study for a number of reasons. Many smaller communities have serious crime problems, so the study of crime in these communities is much needed. Lima (population 40,263) has violent crime rates well above average for its size, experiencing rates of violent crime equal to or above larger cities such as Columbus, Cincinnati and Toledo. Also, crime has an inordinately strong influence in the social and economic performance of small cities and hinders economic recovery efforts. The establishment of an analytical and theoretical framework for evaluating the relationship between aspects of place and the clustering of crime will undoubtedly lead to enhanced crime prevention strategies.

### **Socioeconomic Correlates of Increasing Crime Rates in Smaller Cities**

This research analyzes changes in crime rates by city size and determines the extent to which these changes can be explained by socioeconomic variables. More particularly it addresses rates of change in mean crime rates for violent and property crime between 1976-1984 and 1985-1994 for all U. S. cities, then compares results to Ohio cities. It provides a detailed analysis of changing crime rates in 111 Ohio cities with populations between 10,000 and 99,999 inhabitants and attempts to account for crime differentials between these cities employing linear regression and factor analysis.

### **South Lima: Residential Decay, Crime Hot Spots, and Neighborhoods in Transition**

Lima, Ohio, not unlike most urban places, has experienced urban blight in older downtown neighborhoods, becoming repositories of concentrated poverty, crime, and racial minorities. The process of neighborhood deterioration lowers property values, increases vacancy rates, and discourages private investment. In 2005, sixty new single-family homes were built in South Lima. This research, conducted by ten undergraduate students in a 650 level Urban Geography class under the direction of Dr. William Ackerman, analyzes the location of the new homes with respect to their proximity to existing low quality housing, crime hot spots, suitable open space for additional building, and the impact of three new schools in the area.

### **Spatial Aspects of Youth Violence in Lima, Ohio**

An outreach and engagement/service learning experience for students in a 650 level Urban Geography course at the Ohio State University at Lima. This project developed out of a request by the Chief of Police of Lima for these geography students in this class to take on this youth violence project. There is a long-standing research relationship between Geography at Ohio State Lima and the community. Students are evaluating mean youth violence data by city block for 2005, 2006, and 2007. Results are mapped by standard deviation by block to develop spatial patterns of youth violence in the city. In addition, the 2007 addresses of perpetrators of youth violence are also mapped by standard deviation by block to identify the neighborhoods most responsible for generating violent youth. We identify problem neighborhoods, problem areas within identified neighborhoods, and hot spots within those problem areas. We evaluate the relationship between aspects of place (socioeconomic, demographic, land use, and environmental structures) and the clustering of youth crime. Results are to be presented to community leaders on June 2, 2008.

### **The Concept of Community Policing and a Case Study of Lima, Ohio**

Research analyzes changing crime rates in Lima, Ohio following the implementation of community policing. Crime rates for property crime and violent crime are mapped comparing 1988 rates by census tract to 1997 rates. Lima, Ohio witnessed substantial reduction in crime rates, well above national averages, following the deployment of community policing. Given the inability to control for a wide range of economic and social conditions, it is not possible to say with certainty that the reduction in crime is the result of community

policing. However, one can make a strong circumstantial case that it is.

### **The Spread of Crime to Smaller Ohio Cities and the Spatial Distribution of Crime in Lima, Ohio**

While a substantial body of research exists on crime in large cities, very little is known about the spread of crime to smaller cities or the morphology of crime within small cities. Employing data for selected Ohio cities and a case study of Lima, this project addresses the increase of crime in smaller Ohio cities, the correlation between city size and crime, the association between crime rates and socioeconomic factors, and the location of violent and property crime in Lima.

The mission of Lima Campus Library is to acquire, organize, preserve, and promote access to library resources and services to support the information needs of students, faculty, and staff of Ohio State University at Lima and Rhodes State College. As a clearinghouse for learning, we are committed to create an environment that foster academic inquiry, user empowerment and attainment of lifelong knowledge.

In the area of collection development, we continued to support teaching and instruction by developing and maintaining a strong and balanced collection of information resources in a variety of formats including print, non print and electronic sources. Special attention has been given to selection and acquisition of scholarly materials needed for the four-year programs in Health Sciences, Biological Sciences, History, and Business while we continue to support other existing programs.

In 2008-2009, we acquired 2,729 new book titles, of which 2,490 books belong to OSU and 239 books belong to Rhodes State College. The library also maintained subscription in 310 serial titles including journals and had a total book collection of 83,011 book titles (88,753 volumes). To enhance our resources, we continue to participate in resource sharing and have access to a large number of research databases and electronic journals through our membership in OhioLINK. In the same year, our book budget expenditure totaled \$191,300, of which \$146,300 were allotted by OSU and \$45,000 by Rhodes State College.

In the area of information services, we continued to support, and promote the use of information services and provision of library instruction to our patrons including reference, user education sessions, orientation, tours, and guidance in the use and access of online catalogs and research databases. Moreover, we continue to cooperate with local organizations such as schools, and senior citizens groups as well as collaborating with Lima Public Library in resource sharing.

## **Lima Regional Science Olympiad**

Lima Regional Science Olympiad 2009 was our best attended ever, with 591 students from 37 schools that ranged geographically from Toledo to Sidney. Eleven Ohio State faculty and eleven M.Ed. students ran events; additional M.Ed. students assisted.

# ***Outreach & Engagement***

Give Me Five, a program designed to curb childhood obesity in Allen County, entered its second year in 2008-09. During 2008-09 the program was supported by St. Rita's Medical Center and the Allen County Health Department. Partners include: Ohio State Lima, St. Rita's, Girl Scouts of Western Ohio, Allen County Health Department, and the schools in Allen County. A total of 25 classes and 522 students participated in Give Me Five. Participating schools include Heir Force Academy, Heritage Elementary, Independence Elementary, Shawnee Elementary and Unity Elementary.

## **Celebrate Good Health**

Education Outreach's (Lima) STARLAB portable planetarium Cell cylinder program, combined with innovative child-oriented information on nutrition and follow up new physical activity, is designed to enable students in grades 2-8 to begin to make healthy lifestyle choices. All activities are classroom based.

## **Family Fun Nights**

Family Fun Nights provide the opportunities for schools and community groups to come together to learn about healthy lifestyle: both nutrition and physical activities. All activities engage learners of all ages in hands-on fun games and interactions. A health educator provides an introduction to good nutrition and healthy snacks, including samples. K-12 Outreach's Starlab portable planetarium is transformed into a Cell as participants learn about digestion. Girl Scouts, 4-H and other community partners provide interactive exercises. Family Fun Nights are sponsored by the Allen County Health Department through a grant from the Ohio Department of Health.

## **Many Hats of Agriculture Mystery Theatre**

Through hands on art and creative dramatics, this 2.5 hour classroom activity provides third and fourth graders with an introduction to Ohio's big business of agriculture. Children (and their families) are introduced to over 30 careers related to agribusiness, agricultural products and production, as well as vocabulary and concepts related to agribusiness. The program was developed with an eye toward creating an engaging opportunity for children to begin to understand the importance of agribusiness and at the same time reinforce concepts found on third grade performance outcome measures and the fourth grade proficiency test. # *Staff Offices*

## **The Office of Continuing Education**

The Office of Continuing Education (CED) is a professional development learning facility committed to supporting the organizational mission of The Ohio State University at Lima. We are committed to providing quality professional training programs, seminars and workshops to our rural university campus community that stimulates the intellectual, social, cultural, and technological growth of our region.

The Office of Continuing Education is a member of the State of Ohio EnterpriseOhio Network and plays a key role in the Ohio's economic development infrastructure by partnering with companies and public sector organizations for employee professional development and training.

CED has been an active participant in Governor Strickland's "The Ohio Skills Bank" initiative which incorporates demand-driven alignment of workforce development with regional economic development goals for the state. The Ohio State University at Lima is located in the Ohio Department of Economic Development's region three. The Ohio Skills Bank initiative divides the region three jobs market into four major sectors: business services, distribution and services, health, and manufacturing. Our role has been to collaborate with business and other education institutions in region three to provide credit and non-credit education in support of the needs of our region's employers.

In the business area, we experienced the effects of the economic recession in the amount of training requested by employers. The Office of Continuing Education has partnered with consultants to provide ISO 9000:2000 training to more than 372 employees at eight companies and has provided forklift training to 65 individuals. We expanded our non-credit course offerings by offering on-line courses that provide a convenient method for individuals to improve their skills.

In the health area, the Office of Continuing Education has partnered with the PSA 3 Agency on Aging to provide monthly training programs at their agency since January of 2000. These 3-hour continuing education programs for nurses, social workers, nursing home administrators and other health professionals continue to be in high demand by professionals throughout our region. The topics for the last 12 monthly programs included: Medicare, ethics, aging eye, hearing, psychotropic medications, legal considerations, economic impact on seniors, substance abuse, challenges of clutter and hoarding, medication safety, HIV/AIDS update, and domestic violence. The total number of health professionals served was 777 from 97 different agencies, hospitals and offices.

The Office of Continuing Education also continued to offer its educational program for registered nurses who are interested in the field of Legal Nurse Consulting. This highly specialized class is held in the Cleveland area. The class consists of eight modules held over four months. Class size is small; the 2009 class had 7 participants.

An annual community program sponsored by the Office of Continuing Education is the Administrative Professionals Day event. It is held each year to recognize administrative professionals for their contributions to the workplace. This year's event was held on April 22, 2009, at the Holiday Inn Lima. Seventy-seven administrative professionals attended the event and represented 19 area businesses and agencies. Walt Kinsey, Vice President of Advocacy, Patient Experience and Marketing at St. Rita's, presented an interactive program called "Work Hard But Have FUN Along the Way." Along with the seminar, participants enjoyed a breakfast buffet, vendor booths, and door prizes.

Another annual event is Kids' College. The Office of Continuing Education provides assistance for the Kids' College Camp that is held each summer on the campus of Ohio State Lima. Our office provides registration and support in planning and implementation of this three day event held for sixth, seventh and eighth graders. Forty-four students attended this year's event.
